The session is entitled:
"Empowering Community
Colleges Through Grassroots Advocacy." The
presentation is described as
follows: In today's dynamic

policy environment, higher education institutions face growing challenges in advocating for the needs of their students, faculty, and communities. This presentation will explore the critical role grassroots advocacy can play in shaping policy decisions, strengthening relationships with elected officials, and building sustained support for higher education.

The session will focus on state-based initiatives designed to train institutional advocates through professional development and targeted advocacy programs. Attendees will gain insight into best practices for advocacy training, equipping higher education professionals with the skills needed to lead efforts that influence policy decisions and foster lasting change. Key topics will include the fundamentals of grassroots advocacy, with practical strategies to mobilize campus communities, engage diverse stakeholders, and amplify the voices of institutions.

The speaker for the luncheon is Tyson Elbert, the founder and Executive Director of AdvocacyBuild, LLC. Established in 2017 and based in Washington, DC, AdvocacyBuild works with education, philanthropic, nonprofit, and business communities to develop professional development experiences focusing on leadership, policy, networking, and advocacy. Through this work, Mr. Elbert directs state-based Policy Fellows Programs with education partners in Indiana, Kansas, Mississippi, and Missouri.

Prior to founding AdvocacyBuild, Mr. Elbert spent nearly two decades working in higher education, including the John C. Stennis Institute of Government and Com-

munity Development at Mississippi State University, the Education Policy Center at The University of Alabama, and the Rural Policy Research Institute at The University of Missouri.

Mr. Elbert received his undergraduate degree from the University of Missouri, a Master of Public Affairs from the Harry S Truman School of Public Affairs at the University of Missouri, and a Master of Arts in Political Science from Mississippi State University.

Mr. Elbert has additional certificates from American University's Public Affairs and Advocacy Institute and European Public Affairs and Advocacy Institute programs, as well as the International Comparative Rural Policy Studies program, hosted by a consortium of thirteen international universities. Mr. Elbert also served as a Senior Policy Fellow in the Global Education Policy Fellowship Program hosted by the Institute for Educational Leadership, in partnership with Columbia University's Teachers College and Michigan State University.

The session is designed for presidents, vice presidents, deans, department heads, and directors in two-year degree granting institutions.

## The Dual Advantage: Fast Track to Career After Auburn

The transition after high school graduation is a pivotal moment for any student.

Some are jumping directly into the workforce, while others are gearing up to further their education at universities this fall. Dual enrollment graduates are often able to transition with a distinct advantage over their classmates.

Before even receiving his high school diploma in 2023, Braxton Clines had already crossed the stage at Northeast Alabama Community College (NACC).

By securing a head start, he not only saved time and money but also swiftly earned his white coat at Auburn University's Harrison College of Pharmacy. It typically takes up to seven years of schooling, but he found a way to reduce it by three years when starting at an Alabama community college.

## Alabama's Community Colleges Report Highest Enrollment in Decade

The number of residents pursuing academic credit and workforce credentials through Alabama's community and technical colleges is the highest it has been since 2013.

The Alabama Community College System (ACCS) reported more than 170,000 residents enrolled in academic courses or registered for adult education and workforce training opportunities between August 2023 and July 2024, marking the first time since 2013 in which enrollment had reached those numbers.

Of the 170,000, 122,867 represent the academic headcount in credit-based programs. The remaining number represents those who are pursuing industry-recognized, jobready workforce credentials that prepare residents for indemand jobs throughout Alabama.

The commitment of Alabama's community and technical colleges to align programs with the needs of local and regional employers ensures graduates are job-ready and equipped with the skills required to thrive in today's competitive job market.

The recent enrollment surge is particularly significant in light of ongoing efforts to increase Alabama's college-going rates and labor force participation. ACCS's initiatives, including scholarships, flexible learning options, and support services, have played a crucial role in making college more accessible to underserved communities.

## Miami Dade College and Florida State University Announce New Articulation Agreement

In a continued effort to expand career pathways for students, Miami Dade College (MDC) has established a new transfer articulation agreement with Florida State University (FSU).

The MDC2FSU agreement formalizes a seamless academic transition for MDC students earning an Associate in Arts enabling them to transfer to FSU as juniors and

pursue a bachelor's degree in accordance with the terms of the partnership. The agreement was signed by MDC President Madeline Pumariega and FSU President Richard McCullough.

The first eight MDC2FSU programs selected are: social work, cyber criminology (both criminology and computer science), and entrepreneurship (commercial, retail and STEM). Programs such as psychology and criminology/criminal justice, which traditionally see the most MDC transfer students, are also included.

Upon transferring, students will be supported through FSU's Transfer Student Services and other resources, including enrolling in the IDS 3003 Transfer Connections and Success course during their first semester.

### **Heather Pence Named Interim CTC President**

Ms. Heather Pence, of Pickens County, Florida, is serving as the Interim President of Chattahoochee Technical College (CTC) following the recent retirement of Dr. Ron Newcomb.

Ms. Pence served previously as the Executive Vice President for Operations at Chattahoochee Tech, where she was instrumental in advancing the college across financial, technology, and administrative divisions. Fresh out of college with a bachelor's degree in accounting, she began her career in state

government at the Georgia Department of Audits and Accounts. It was while auditing multiple technical colleges for this state agency that Ms. Pence said she began to realize the value added to Georgians through technical education. She then accepted a position with Appalachian Technical College, which is now part of Chattahoochee Tech, and continued to serve within the TCSG system for two decades. She was selected in 2023, for the first cohort of 25 participants from across the state in the TCSG Senior Leadership Academy, a year-long professional development program.

Ms. Pence earned a bachelor's degree from North Georgia College and State University. She then earned an MBA at Reinhardt University.

# **Technical College System of Georgia Achieves Highest Enrollment Since 2013**

The Technical College System of Georgia (TCSG) announced a 9.3% increase in enrollment for the Academic Year 2024 (AY24), bringing total enrollment to 148,746 students across the system. This is the highest number of students enrolled at TCSG since 2013, a testament to the grow-

ing demand for skilled workers in Georgia and the increasing attractiveness of TCSG's career-focused college programs.

The rise in enrollment from AY23's 136,114 students reflect the statewide focus by TCSG's 22 colleges on workforce development and the critical role that technical education plays in supporting Georgia's growing economy. Additionally, total credit hours saw a significant 10.6% increase, highlighting students' commitment to advancing their skills through higher education.

### **Key Highlights from AY24:**

- Total Enrollment: 148,746 students, a 9.3% increase from 136,114 students in AY23 and the highest enrollment since 2013.
- **Credit Hours:** A 10.6% increase in total credit hours taken by students.
- High-Demand Programs: Enrollment in highdemand programs surged by 11.6%, reflecting growing interest in industries vital to Georgia's economy, such as healthcare, manufacturing, information technology, and aviation.
- College Growth: 21 out of TCSG's 22 colleges reported enrollment growth during AY24, demonstrating a system-wide commitment to providing relevant, affordable education across the state.

This enrollment surge reflects TCSG's ongoing mission to ensure that Georgia's residents have access to career focused college education that prepares them for the state's expanding job market. TCSG continues to play a pivotal role in maintaining Georgia's standing as the number one state in the nation to do business by producing a highly skilled workforce.

### **KENTUCKY**

## Dr. Brooke L. Justice Named Interim President of SKYCTC



The Kentucky Community and Technical College System recently named Dr. Brooke L. Justice as interim president of Southcentral Kentucky Community and Technical College. Dr. Justice, who currently serves as vice president of student services at SKYCTC, began her new role August 16, 2024.

Dr. Brooke L. Justice Dr. Justice has served in various roles throughout her nearly 20-year

career in higher education. Her passion for the community college began at Bowling Green Technical College, which later grew into SKYCTC. She has extensive experience in higher education including the areas of strategic enrollment management, academic success and stu-

dent pathways.

Dr. Justice earned her bachelor's and master's degrees from Western Kentucky University and her doctorate in educational leadership from the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Justice replaces Dr. Phil Neal who was appointed recently as acting executive vice president and provost for KCTCS.

### **KCTCS Offers GED Opportunities to Inmates**

There were 4,460 incarcerated individuals who earned a GED through the Kentucky Community and Technical College System from 2020-2024. During the same period, enrollments in the GED prep classes, taught by the colleges' adult education instructors, grew to 14,441.

"When we say KCTCS is education for all, that's exactly what we mean. Supporting those who lack a high school diploma is a key priority for our state and workforce," said KCTCS President Ryan Quarles.

"Everyone benefits if these individuals reenter our communities and the workforce with a credential that will help them build better lives for themselves and their families," added Dr. Quarles, who was recently appointed to the Governor's Council of Second Chance Employers.

According to published studies, education not only benefits inmates, but it also produces societal benefits, such as lowering rates of recidivism when they are released," said Maggie Price, director of student success at Maysville Community and Technical College.

Fourteen KCTCS colleges are service providers for Kentucky Adult Education, the state agency that administers the GED program. Classes are held at county jails and prisons.

### KCTCS/SKYCTC Reports Record Year in Workforce Training

Southcentral Kentucky Community and Technical College (SKYCTC) as well as the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS) set new workforce training records in fiscal year 2024, according to a new report released by KCTCS' Workforce Solutions program. The report provides system-level data on the impact of Workforce Solutions and numerous statewide programs and provides a breakout of impact by each of the system's colleges.

KCTCS invested an increase of \$2 million in the TRAINS program to meet employer demand. The system's total annual investment in the program was \$7.4 million. Utilizing funding from the Kentucky General Assembly for the TRAINS program, Workforce Solutions trains businesses' new hires with the aim of accelerating full productivity levels while helping retain incumbent workers through upskilling opportunities. TRAINS has been shown to offset the

cost of training for businesses by up to 75%. In fiscal year 2024, KCTCS partnered with Kentucky companies on 339 TRAINS projects, up from 248 last year, a 37% increase. This resulted in \$10.87 million in gross revenue generated for the colleges, compared to \$8.6 million last year. New clients increased 15% and repeat clients grew 51%.

KCTCS continues to be the number one provider of workforce training in Kentucky. One out of every 49 Kentucky jobs is supported by the activities of KCTCS colleges and students.

## Nunez Chancellor Invited to the White House for Aerospace Workforce Roundtable

The Aerospace Manufacturing Technology program at Nunez Community College was represented recently at a Space Workforce Roundtable at the White House in Washington D.C. by Nunez Chancellor Tina Tinney, Ed. D. and facilitated by the Office of the Vice President, the National Space Council, the Department of Labor and the Department of Education.

Nunez's Aerospace program, represented by Dr. Tinney, was part of a roundtable discussion comprised of approximately 30 federal authorities, education leaders and industry representatives. The focus of the discussion was strengthening, diversifying and growing the aerospace workforce. Educational pathways and industry-based credentials that train future technicians in core competencies were shared.

Nunez Community College will participate in the Space4All campaign launched by the U.S. Department of Education. The STEM awareness campaign was recently launched to expose individuals to opportunities aligned with the aerospace industry, the economic impact of the industry, and to spark students' interest in STEM careers and space exploration.

Additionally, Nunez Community College will serve as a subject matter expert in vetting a nationwide aerospace competency model being developed by the U.S. Department of Labor to establish critical curriculum for aerospace pathways.

### **BPCC Expands Health Care Programs**

Bossier Parish Community College (BPCC) has expanded its Nursing and Allied Health program offerings at the

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Natchitoches and Sabine Valley (Many) campuses. These new additions provide students in rural areas with greater access to high-demand careers in healthcare and administrative fields.

The BPCC Natchitoches campus has launched several new healthcare-related programs, including EKG/ Telemetry, Emergency Medical Technician, Phlebotomy, and Medical Records and Billing Assistant. In addition, the campus will soon offer a Respiratory Therapy program, giving students even more pathways to pursue careers in the healthcare industry.

At BPCC's Sabine Valley campus in Many, new programs include Medical Records and Billing Assistant, Emergency Medical Technician, and Medical Assistant. EMS students at the Natchitoches campus are able to work on their skills in a full-size ambulance simulator. These programs are designed to meet the growing demand for healthcare professionals in the region, offering students practical skills and certification opportunities close to home.

The BPCC Natchitoches Campus offers a wide range of educational opportunities, including career and technical education programs, general education courses, high school dual enrollment, WorkReady U (adult basic education), and workforce development training.

### **MISSISSIPPI**

## Co-Lin's Paramedic Training Program Earns National Accreditation

Copiah-Lincoln Community College's (Co-Lin) Paramedic Training Program has earned national accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP). This prestigious recognition highlights the program's commitment to excellence in paramedic education, ensuring that students receive the highest quality training available.

The program provides an essential step for current EMTs seeking to advance their careers in emergency medical services. Students in the program complete over 1,300 clock hours of intense classroom instruction, hands-on training, and clinical rotations, equipping them with the knowledge and skills needed to perform at the highest levels in the field.

Graduates of the program are well-prepared to pursue licensure and employment in emergency medical services, contributing to the health and safety of communities throughout the region.

#### **ECCC Leads State in Enrollment Growth**

East Central Community College (ECCC) in Decatur continues to set the pace for student enrollment growth among

Mississippi's 15 community colleges, boasting a 24% increase in headcount since the fall of 2021, the highest in the state. Over the past year alone, enrollment grew by 6.8%, further solidifying ECCC's position as a top choice for students seeking a comprehensive, affordable educational experience.

ECCC's enrollment surge is largely attributed to its focus on student success and retention initiatives. The college continues to build a reputation for offering exceptional education, a full collegiate experience, and strong support services—all while maintaining affordability.

### **NORTH CAROLINA**

## Community Colleges Play Vital Role in Disaster Response After Hurricane Helene

In the aftermath of Hurricane Helene's devastation across Western North Carolina, community colleges stepped up as crucial emergency response hubs, supporting relief efforts by federal, state, and nonprofit organizations. With 14 colleges affected by the storm, these community colleges quickly transformed into staging grounds and operational bases for disaster teams, emergency responders, power companies, and displaced residents.

A statewide Helene Relief Fund was created by the North Carolina Community College System and colleges raced to find generators and emergency internet in the days after Helene. The System Office worked with agency partners to drive and helicopter Starlink systems and generators to western colleges.

- Asheville-Buncombe Technical Community College (A-B Tech) became a regional emergency hub, sheltering 179 displaced individuals and providing medical assistance to an additional 60 people. The college also staged 300 ambulances to assist with potential evacuations and housed shelter workers across multiple campuses
- Blue Ridge Community College in Hendersonville
  has been transformed into a multi-functional recovery
  base, supporting local emergency services, and
  search and rescue teams. The Health Sciences
  Campus was designated for triage services to assist
  the nearby hospital, while other parts of the college
  served as shelters and staging areas for relief workers. Despite the campus itself facing significant damage, including power, water, and cell service outages, the college quickly adapted
- Caldwell Community College & Technical Institute, which is home to hard-hit Boone and Watauga County, opened its doors to Samaritan's Purse and Duke Energy, providing a critical space for coordinating recovery logistics and staging response opera-

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tions. The campus became a base for rapid mobilization, ensuring that resources reached impacted areas quickly and efficiently.

- Western Piedmont Community College in Morganton became a key player in the region's recovery efforts, staging 450 trucks and 750 personnel from Duke Energy to support extensive power restoration across the area.
- Wilkes Community College experienced significant damage and was closed for 12 days before opening as a resource center on October 7. Their Ashe Campus provided access to power and internet connectivity for students, employees, and the local community.
- Spruce Pines, home to Mayland Community College, was one of the most devastated areas in Western North Carolina. While they have opened their doors to faculty and staff, there is no timetable yet to resume instruction.
- Haywood Community College provided access to showers and laundry for employees and students, while also housing 40 to 50 displaced individuals each day. The college's facilities are being used by the local Chamber of Commerce and an engineering firm to continue operations amid the disruption. Emergency responders are expected to establish a base on campus shortly, further bolstering recovery efforts. Additionally, the campus serves as a landing zone for search and rescue helicopters, facilitating rapid deployment in critical situations.
- Isothermal Community College became a crucial staging ground for more than 600 Duke Energy trucks and up to 1,500 personnel, as well as National Guard equipment. In response to the significant communication challenges caused by the loss of cell towers, the college opened its doors to employees and their families, offering essential services such as power, water, WiFi, and meals.
- Cleveland Community College not only provided space for community dinners but also accommodated the local Health Department to deliver essential services to residents.
- McDowell Technical Community College provided space as an Emergency Operations Center and helped facilitate a warehouse for donations of basic needs. Their Universal Building supported the shipping and receiving of donations. The campus also housed the Greenville Swift Water Rescue Team and campsite evacuees.
- Southwestern Community College's Jackson Campus served as a staging area for tanker trucks to refuel first responders and stands ready to serve as an overflow shelter when needed.

Many other counties saw significant damage to roads and trees, but impacts to campus operations varied. Cleveland Community College, Catawba Valley Community College, Tri-County Community College and Gaston Col-

lege were able to resume operations in the days after Helene, but their campuses worked to support line workers, donations, and other community supports for hurricane victims.

### **SOUTH CAROLINA**

### **SCC Assists With Hurricane Relief**

Spartanburg Community College (SCC) employees, alongside President Dr. Michael Mikota, gathered donations from students, staff, and community members to support those affected by Hurricane Helene in Western North Carolina. The team of volunteers consisting of SCC employees, as well as Dr. Mikota and his family, delivered two trailers filled with essential supplies—ranging from water, coats, and generators to canned goods and baby essentials and more—directly to Blue Ridge Community College.

While the two teams were working together to unload donations, you could see tears of joy and gratitude from both sides. After delivery to Blue Ridge Community College, the employees and volunteers at Blue Ridge would work on distributing donations to families and areas in need.

"What an incredible gift. We are forever grateful, and we are now Chasers!" exclaimed Dr. Laura Leatherwood, President of Blue Ridge Community College.

### **SCTCS Launches AI for the Trained Eye**

South Carolina's technical colleges are committed to staying at the forefront of emerging technologies. This summer, the South Carolina Technical College System's (SCTCS) Division of Academics, Student Affairs, and Research, in partnership with Central Carolina Technical College, launched a professional development series, *AI for the Trained Eye*, designed for faculty and staff across all disciplines. This cross-disciplinary program offered participants the chance to delve into AI's transformative role in teaching, learning, and work practices. Through hands-on activities, collaborative projects, and thoughtful discussions on ethical considerations, educators and professionals gained insights into how AI can be integrated effectively and responsibly across diverse educational settings in the state.

Recently, the System hosted a one-day Al conference, *A New Era: Al in Higher Education and the Workforce*, which worked to underscore further the importance of Al in education, particularly in enhancing the student experience. Attended by nearly 200 faculty, staff, and administrators from the System's 16 colleges, the conference brought together leaders from community colleges, state agencies, and industry to explore Al's impact on student engagement, personalized learning paths, and workplace skills development. Highlights included a presentation by Dr. Greg DeSantis from Jobs for the Future (JFF), which showcased Al's potential to streamline student services and foster inclusive

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learning environments. Dr. Wes Fondren from Coastal Carolina University delivered an engaging keynote on how AI can serve as a practical tool for students, faculty, and administrators, offering tangible examples of how to use AI productively and responsibly. The conference reinforced the SC Technical College System's dedication to innovation, preparing students and educators alike for a future shaped by AI technologies.
